

Peter was one of five candidates, and was selected as the Principal Candidate for the ceremony. One of the other candidates, and District Commander designate for the District of Gold Coast Tweed Valley, Region 2, Em. Bro. Brian Ling, 32° CoM, formerly of Tasmania, will be remembered by many Freemasons in Tasmania. Brian is a Past Master of Lodge Esk and was actively involved in the Grand Lodge of Tasmania.

Having received the degree, Very Illustrious Brother Peter Pfundt assumed the office of District Commander for the District of Tasmania, Bass, and was officially installed in that office on Saturday 4 August 2108 by the Regional Commander for Region 8 and Lieutenant Grand Commander of the Rite, Very Powerful Bro. Bill Morgan, 33°. Peter succeeds Very Illustrious

Bro. Ray Chell as District Commander and his term of office is five years.

The 33⁰ degree is described as an 'administrative degree' and purpose is to prepare candidates to assume the responsibilities of office as District Commander. The degree is worked once each year in Sydney Supreme when the Council convenes. Several days are devoted to meetings, including the degree ceremony, and social events; the session culminating in the Grand Gala Banquet at the NSW Masonic Club.

Vale — M. W. Bro. Norman Roy Cooper



Norman Roy Cooper, one of the most distinguished Freemasons in this State, was mourned by members of the Masonic Fraternity by his passing on the 2nd Sept, 2018.

M.W. Bro. Cooper was born on 5th March 1937. He was an electrician by trade and

worked for a number of refrigeration firms before establishing his own successful business, Southern Air.

Norm was married to his wife, Cyrene for 60 years, had two daughters, a son, 10 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

He served 55 years of devoted Masonic service. He was part of a chain of Masonic tradition in the Cooper family: his father Roy was a member of Tasmania Operative Lodge, his late brother Jack and his son Allan, members of Lodge Clarence.

Norm's Masonic career began when he joined Lodge Clarence on 25th May 1963. He retained his Freemasonry membership until his passing, then as a member of Lodge Lindisfarne, which was formed following the amalgamation of Lodge Clarence with a number of other Eastern Shore Lodges.

Norm worked his way through the various offices of Lodge Clarence and was elected as Master in 1983. He was a driving force for many years and in latter years was the Preceptor at both Lodge Clarence and Lodge Lindisfarne.

In 2013 he received his 50 years' service certificate. Earlier in 2018 he was awarded the Lodge Order of Merit, the equivalent to Life Membership.

He also affiliated with the Lodge of Research, Lodge Phoenix, Lodge Themis and Lodge Beltana: joining the two latter Lodges when they needed material assistance.

Norm was a little tardy in becoming involved with Grand Lodge, but made up for it in the last eighteen years with a tireless contribution. He served as a Grand Lodge Officer in various capacities, was appointed Deputy Grand Master in 2005 and installed

as Grand Master in 2008.

Norm was a no-nonsense man – his leadership qualities showing in all aspects of his Masonic career. If a task had to be undertaken he got on with it and got it done, preferably yesterday. It was a standing joke that Norm did not have the word "protocols" in his vocabulary; he didn't know what the word meant, apart from when it suited him!.

He served on the Board of General Purposes from 2005 until 2011 and again in 2014/15. He also served on the Board of Benevolence from 2000 to 2010.

He was the Grand Lodge representative for the Grand Lodge of Indiana.

Norm travelled to every part of the State attending masonic meetings with his lovely wife, Cyrene, by his side. They attended Grand Installations in all Australasian jurisdictions. Norm also visited and established a fraternal friendship with the French speaking Lodge in New Caledonia.

After completing his term of Office as Grand Master he did not go into semi - retirement, quite the contrary, he just continued at the same hectic pace.

In addition to Craft Masonry, Norm was at various times, involved in a number of other Orders, including Knight Templars, Knight Templar Priests, Order of the Secret Monitor, Royal Arch Chapter, Rose Croix and Royal Order of Scotland, just to name a few. He attained the office of Deputy Provincial Grand Master in the Royal Order of Scotland, High Priest in the Knight Templar Priests, and rose to the 31st degree in Rose Croix masonry.

However, it was the Tasmanian Lodge of Mark Master Masons under the Victorian Constitution for which he had a great love. He served that Lodge for the past 36 years, having joined on 7th Dec. 1982. The high regard in which he was held was acknowledged by the Grand Master from the United Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of Victoria being present at his funeral.

He progressed through the various offices of the Mark Lodge and was elected as Master on 11th March 1993. Norm played a major role in hosting the Victorian members whenever they visited this State. He

also paid regular visits to the biennial Grand Installation Ceremonies held in Melbourne.

His valued service to the Order was acknowledged on no less than three occasions when he had Past Grand Rank conferred on him, culminating in 2017 when he received the rank of Past Deputy Grand Master.

Masonic Christmas in Renmark, SA

As Tony and I stayed in Renmark SA for a couple of weeks visiting family on our grey-nomadding adventures, we were made welcome by the Renmark Masonic Lodge at their Annual Christmas function at the Renmark Hotel. A good evening was enjoyed by all —thank you to the Renmark and Berri Lodge members for your hospitality.

A Masonic Pocket Watch

Masonically themed clocks and watches are not uncommon. Indeed, many different designs were produced prior to the Second World War and even today one can buy wristwatches with masonic symbols on the dial. My interest was excited, however, when contacted by a friend in New Zealand with the suggestion that I look at the on-line catalogue of well-known Auckland auction house, as there was a masonic watch for sale.

It was a masonic watch indeed – it was a pair-cased verge watch dated 1780, by known Sheffield maker, Francis Wheelhouse, with not only masonic symbols painted on the enamel dial but also with a finely fretted and engraved watch cock (the cover for the balance wheel) illustrating yet further masonic symbols. The latter made the watch particularly unusual. While watches of this vintage with masonic symbols

painted on the dial are known but scarce, it is particularly unusual to find one with a finely fretted and engraved watch cock also illustrating masonic symbols — indeed, almost like a miniature tracing board.

Francis Wheelhouse was born in Sheffield in 1733 and professed his trade as a watchmaker in both Sheffield and the Isle of Man. He died in Lisbon, Portugal in 1814. That he was a skilled watchmaker there can be no doubt. The quality of his work, as illustrated by this watch is outstanding. That he was Freemason is also likely as the manner in which the masonic symbols have been assembled on this watch had to be the work of somebody skilled in masonry.

Like all watchmakers of his time he was skilled in the mechanical arts generally and, as a consequence, was involved in the establishment of a cotton mill in Rothesay, Scotland, in partnership in with watchmaking partner, James Kenyon, and Jonathan Moore, 'victualler' of Sheffield. Following this venture, he rented the Ballasalla Cotton Spinning Mill in Malew on the Isle of Man together with his son-in-law, Abraham de la Pryme, whose family had come from Flanders and had an interest in the textile industry. What took him to Lisbon is anybody's guess, but he was obviously a man of capital and something of an adventurer prepared to speculate in order to improve his fortune.

This watch was probably commissioned by a wealthy Freemason and could only have been afforded by a person with

considerable disposable income. An ordinary silver watch cost in the order of five guineas in those days and this watch is anything but ordinary. It would be equivalent today to buying a very expensive Rolex. Unfortunately

the watch came without a provenance. It had been sent to auction by a retired watchmaker with whom it had been left for repair many decades before and had never been collected by the owner. One can only speculate on the proud Freemason who owned it and on the many subsequent generations through whose hands it has passed.

My thanks go to Catherine Hynes, widow of Very Illustrious Brother Mervyn Hynes 33°, Scottish Constitution, for both locating the watch for me and for venturing out on a blustery stormy night to bid on it for me (and with her stern and determined demeanour for scaring off all opponent bidders).
